Claiming Canaan, Lessons from the Book of Joshua
Lesson 10: Cursed & Cleansed (7:1-26)

When they strapped on their armor, they felt invincible. If God was for them, who could be against them (Romans 8:31)! "By this you will know that the living God is among you... that He will without fail drive out from before you the Canaanites," Joshua proclaimed (3:10). But all was not as it seemed.

Upon their return, devastation swept through the camp as violently as the waves of the Jordan (Joshua 7:5). Dismayed and demoralized, Israel had been defeated. Thirty-six men laid dead on the slopes of the land that God had promised to give to them.

Unknown to them, inward corruption was hiding in the home and heart of one man and his family. Among millions, it may have seemed a trivial matter. But God knew that this "little leaven" (Galatians 5:9) would destroy far more than those lost on the battle field; it would become the demise of the nation.

Israel must learn that sin could not be covered, nor contained, nor concealed without consequence to all.

Read Joshua 7:1-9.

14. What was God's solution? (vv.12-13)										
15. What consequence would come to the Israelites if they refused to confront and destroy the accursed thing(s) among them? (v.12)										
16. Why might the Lord have chosen to filter through the people in this manner?
