6: Patient Endurance (2 Peter 1:6)

Second Peter 1:6b says, "Self-control leads to patient endurance, and patient endurance leads to godliness."

Read Psalm 69:1-36.

"You cannot persevere unless there is a trial in your life. There can be no victories without battles; there can be no peaks without valleys." Romans 5:3 says, "We too can rejoice when we run into problems and trials, for we know that they are good for us—they help us learn to endure."

Read James 5:7-11. It is hard to find a better example of patient endurance than in the book of Job. Faced with overwhelming circumstances, Job remained faithful to God. In Job 2:10 he declares, "Shall we indeed accept good from God, and shall we not accept adversity?" The text goes on to say, "In all this Job did not sin with his lips" (NKJV).

Isaiah 45:7b says, "I am the one who sends good times and bad times. I, the Lord, am the one who does these things." Why do you believe God allows trials and suffering in the lives of the righteous?

Read Job 1:1-2:13. Can you relate to his sufferings?

- Job suffered the loss of his livelihood and servants. (Loss of a job or co-worker)
- Job suffered the loss of his children. (Loss of family)
- Job's health was taken from him. (Sickness)
- Job suffered persecution from his wife. (Unbelieving spouse or family)
- · Job suffered false accusations from his closest friends.

Feelings of despair, sadness, and misery can easily overtake you amidst your troubles. In Chapter 3, Job shares the depth of his sorrows. Why do we lose hope, forgetting God's faithfulness during these times?

Perseverance

The Greek word hupomone, or patient endurance, listed in 2 Peter 1:6 is defined as steadfastness, constancy, and perseverance. It is remaining dedicated to God, without yielding, during the greatest
